





This edition doesn't seek to define creativity, but rather invites you to experience it. It moves between tradition and experimentation, between structure and spontaneity, offering a space where both can belong.

As we step into the academic year 2025–26, we proudly reflect on a year of remarkable growth, with MMMUT advancing steadily towards a future-ready vision, driven by innovation, research, inclusion, and service for the well-being of humanity and mankind.

The University has established Indian Knowledge System Department (IKSD) adhering with the NEP 2020 to nurture, preserve and research ancient Indian knowledge. Further, the University has also established Educational Studies Department (ESD) for B.Ed. courses. The University continues to gain national and global recognition for academic and research excellence. Ranked 25<sup>th</sup> in India by India Today's Best Technical University Ranking 2025 and 3<sup>rd</sup> among State Universities in Uttar Pradesh in the Transparent Rankings 2025 by Cybermetrics Lab, the University has shown impactful research with over 33,000 citations. MoUs with INFLIBNET Centre and Rashtriya Raksha University, Gandhinagar were signed in the presence of Hon'ble Chancellor and Governor, Smt. Anandiben Patel Ji. The Minor Degree in Robotics and Automation, along with a cutting-edge lab, reflects our focus on future-ready education. The upcoming School of Medical Science and Technology will foster the interdisciplinary growth.

Driving social impact and student welfare, the University has introduced transformative initiatives, like the Wisdom on Wheels Digital Lab, a mobile unit enhancing rural digital literacy through SBI's CSR initiative. The infrastructure has undergone major upgrades, including a state-of-the-art, boys' hostel with a capacity of 528, equipped with modern amenities, set to be the largest on campus. Renovation and geo-tagging of hostels will provide safer, smarter living for over 1,600 students. With 114 researchers in the World Scientist Rankings 2025, published by AD Scientific Rankings, and a rise to 172<sup>nd</sup> rank in India in the ranking on the basis of the i10 index this year, MMMUT is emerging as a hub of innovation and research. The MMMUT NDLI Club ranked first in the National Digital Libraries rankings in Uttar Pradesh region and became the recipient of the Award of Excellence.

The University marked a milestone with more than 1,000 placement offers, including a top package of Rs. 59 LPA from Uber and Rs. 45 LPA from Amazon. Key recruiters included Zomato, IBM, BEL, L&T, Accenture, TCS, MG Motors, Aditya Birla Group, JSW, Cognizant, and HDFC Ltd. Academically, 157 students qualified GATE 2025, with others excelling in state-level competitions. Bathed in the spirit of achievements and the anticipations of promising futures, the ninth convocation ceremony of Madan Mohan Malaviya University of Technology, Gorakhpur, held on August 29, 2024, was not merely a formal academic tradition, but a celebration of journeys completed and dreams taking flight. The Multi-Purpose Hall brimmed with pride, reflection, and optimism, as students, mentors, and dignitaries gathered to mark a defining milestone in the lives of the graduating class. Presided over by the Hon'ble Chancellor and Governor of Uttar Pradesh, Smt. Anandiben Patel, the ceremony was graced by the presence of eminent ISRO scientist and Padma Bhushan, Shri S. Nambi Narayanan as the Chief Guest. The Minister of Technical Education, Government of Uttar Pradesh, Shri Ashish Patel, attended the occasion as the Special Guest. Donning traditional academic attire, the dignitaries entered the venue in a ceremonial procession led by the Hon'ble Chancellor, followed by the Chief Guest and Special Guest, and then the university's esteemed faculty members. The hall stood in respect as the National Anthem resonated through the air, formally commencing the grand ceremony. A moment of great honour unfolded as the Hon'ble Chancellor conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Science upon Shri S. Nambi Narayanan, in recognition of his pioneering contributions to Indian space research. Following this, the degree felicitation began — a defining moment for the graduates, encapsulating their years of diligence and dedication. A total of 1,462 degrees

were awarded across various disciplines, including 1,028 B.Tech graduates (164 from Civil Engineering, 186 from Computer Science & Engineering, 172 from Electrical Engineering, 171 from Electronics and Communication Engineering, 161 from Mechanical Engineering, 80 from Chemical Engineering, and 94 from Information Technology). Additionally, 67 students from BBA, 130 from M. Tech, 72 from MBA, 70 from MCA, 25 from M. Sc (Physics), 21 from M. Sc (Chemistry), 13 from M. Sc (Mathematics), and 36 PhD scholars received their degrees. In recognition of academic excellence, 42 gold medals were awarded to 19 meritorious students, comprising 1 Chancellor's Gold Medal, 19 Vice-Chancellor's Gold Medals, and 22 sponsored medals. Among the recipients, Ms. Udisha Singh, the topper of B.Tech in Electronics and Communication Engineering, earned a remarkable six gold medals, the highest by any individual this year. Rank certificates were also distributed to students securing second and third positions in their respective programs. Delivering the welcome address, the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor presented the Annual Progress Report of the university, highlighting its recent academic and research milestones. The Hon'ble Chancellor, Smt. Anandiben Patel, lauded the university's commendable performance in the NIRF 2024 rankings, stating that Indian universities possess immense potential and must aim to reach the top ranks globally. She emphasized that with focused effort and strategic vision, nothing is impossible. Addressing the youth, she encouraged them to be at the forefront of India's vision for a developed future and underscored the need to build an India where farmers are empowered, and women are free from exploitation. In her speech, she urged young students to stay abreast with emerging technologies and equip



themselves for industrial relevance. She emphasized that technical universities should not only impart education but also cultivate industry-ready graduates. In a notable step toward digital transformation, the Hon'ble Chancellor initiated the simultaneous uploading of all degrees and marksheets to DigiLocker through a ceremonial digital launch during the event.

Staying true to its commitment to social responsibility, the university welcomed 25 school children from its adopted villages to attend the convocation, also the Hon'ble Vice-

Chancellor distributed kits containing books, writing materials, and fruits to them. The Hon'ble Chancellor personally handed out 20 educational kits to anganwadis from the Kushinagar district, as part of the total 52 kits provided during the event. Adding to the cultural and intellectual richness of the occasion, the Hon'ble Chancellor, along with other dignitaries, released multiple university publications which includes, 'Malvika', the Annual University magazine; the Annual Progress Report; and a book authored by Dr. S. P. Singh. The Department of Chemistry and Environmental Science was also felicitated by the Hon'ble Chancellor for its excellence in research. In his address, the Chief Guest, Shri S. Nambi Narayanan, shared his journey, urging the students to remain committed to their passion and to pursue excellence with integrity. The Special Guest, Shri Ashish Patel, extended his heartfelt congratulations and highlighted the vital role that technical institutions play in nation building. As the ceremony drew to a close, the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor presented mementoes to the Chief Guest and the Special Guest. A heartfelt Vote of Thanks was delivered by the Registrar, Prof. Jai Prakash, marking the end of a truly momentous day.

The Convocation was not merely an academic ritual but also a festival of emotions. Families who had travelled from far and wide filled the campus, their faces glowing with pride. Students shared hugs, laughter, and stories, immortalizing the day with countless photographs. Faculty members, many of whom had mentored these students since their first day on campus, watched with satisfaction as their protégés stepped confidently into the next phase of life. The cultural segments that accompanied the ceremony added colour and vibrancy. # ENTREVISTA

D.C.  
*Srivastava*



An alumnus of Electronics and Telecommunication Engineering branch of 1991 of MMMUT (formerly MMMEC), Shri Devesh Chandra Srivastava is a 1995-batch Indian Police Service officer of the AGMUT cadre with nearly 30 years of distinguished service. Renowned for his leadership across policing, intelligence, and public safety, he has made a lasting impact both in India and foreign assignments. The Editorial Board is honored to present an excerpt from an interview with him, where he shares key experiences and insights that have shaped his remarkable journey.

**Q) How did your college experience shape your career or personal development?**

My college experience was immensely enriching. As I mentioned earlier, the camaraderie we shared and the challenges we encountered during the formative years of our graduation played a significant role in shaping both my professional and personal outlook. The faculty at MMMUT was exceptional and deeply supportive. The systems in place were robust, our campus was completely free from any sort of malpractices like “copying,” and classroom decorum was well-maintained. There existed a strong culture of mutual respect between students and teachers, which created a highly conducive environment for learning and growth.

**Q) You served as the editor of Sanket magazine and were part of The Editorial Board. Could you please tell us about that experience?**

Yes, I was fortunate to be part of the founding editorial team of Sankalp, and later I served as the editor of Sanket magazine. These experiences not only honed my leadership and communication skills but also instilled in me a deep sense of responsibility. Engaging with creative content, managing a team, and ensuring timely publication, all of it helped shape my personality and broadened my perspective beyond technical education.

**Q) What motivated you to transition from engineering services to the police services?**

My ultimate goal was always to enter the civil services. Engineering was one of the subjects I was passionate about, so I pursued Physics and Electrical Engineering. However, the broader canvas of civil services appealed to me because it allowed for the application of a wide range of skills, including those acquired through engineering. The technological challenges and innovations in policing and administration today demand a strong technical foundation, which I already had, and that made the transition both meaningful and impactful.

**Q) Coming from a small village in Azamgarh and reaching a top administrative position, what advice would you offer to students from similar backgrounds?**

First and foremost, have unwavering faith in yourself.

Secondly, always remember that no dream is too big or too small, think big, but take consistent small steps toward your goals. And most importantly, uphold your ethics. Success may take time, but what matters most is being honest, both to the cause you are working for and in your personal and professional life. Integrity is non-negotiable.

**Q) Did you begin your civil services preparation during college or afterwards?**

During college, my engagement was more inclined towards general knowledge and current affairs, I actively participated in debates and discussions. However, formal preparation for the civil services began after I graduated. The interest was always there, but the focused effort came later.

**Q) How did your engineering background from MMMUT contribute to your approach in law enforcement and administration?**

Engineering instills in you a logical and analytical mindset. As technocrats, we are trained to approach every problem with reasoning and depth. This mindset greatly aids in addressing complex administrative challenges. Moreover, the ability to understand and leverage technological advancements, be it CCTV surveillance, big data analytics, AI, or even small systemic improvements has been instrumental in driving innovation in policing and law enforcement. An engineering background equips you with the tools to adapt and implement these advancements effectively.

**Q) You served as the DGP of Mizoram in 2022. How was your experience working in the Northeast?**

It was a very enriching experience. While the region does come with its own set of challenges, it also offers immense opportunities for learning and growth. Being part of such a diverse cultural and geographical landscape allowed me to understand new communities, embrace new ideas, and innovate in the field. It was a valuable phase in my career, and I truly appreciated the opportunity to serve there.

**Q) Given that Mizoram shares international borders with countries like Bangladesh and Myanmar, what kind of challenges did you face in border policing?**

Border policing in such regions demands intricate coordination. For instance, along the Myanmar border, forces like the Assam Rifles are deployed, while the Bangladesh border is managed by the BSF. The state police acts as the second line of defense and works in close coordination with these central forces. We jointly monitor and secure the borders, ensuring that any illegal activity, whether originating from across the border or within, is detected and dealt with effectively. This collaborative approach is crucial to maintaining border integrity and internal security.



# UNIVERSITY ANNUAL REPORT

The ECE Department of MMMUT has received a research grant of ₹1.12 crore from MeitY, Government of India under the Visvesvaraya PhD Scheme. The funding will support advanced research in Drones and Semiconductors.

# OPERATION SIND OR



**O**n April 22, 2025, the picturesque Baisaran Valley of Pahalgam in Jammu and Kashmir was scarred by a brutal and heinous terrorist attack on tourists, perpetrated by Pakistan - based terrorist groups and its proxies. Years after the abrogation of Article 370, the massacre, which claimed 26 lives, was a deliberate attempt to sabotage the peace and prosperity in Kashmir valley. India's response, Operation Sindoar, was a precise, non-escalatory military operation that showcased its technological might, and unwavering commitment to safeguarding its sovereignty, people, and motherland. Operation Sindoar reaffirmed India's resolve to crush terrorism and its sponsors.

In recent years, tourism surged in Pahalgam massively, attracting over 1.2 million visitors in 2024, drawn to its serene landscapes and vibrant cultural festivals. The attack was a desperate bid to sow fear and communal discord, targeting Hindu tourists to undermine Kashmir's harmony. This was not the first assault by the sponsors of terrorism, previous attacks, including the 2008 Mumbai attacks that killed 166 people, the 2016 Pathankot airbase attack, Uri attack in the same year and Pulwama attack in 2019, exposed the malicious propaganda of India's neighbour in harbouring terrorism and proxy war against humanity.

India has never initiated aggression but responds with unmatched resolve when provoked. True to this ethos, Operation Sindoar was launched by Indian armed forces on May 7, 2025, targeting nine terrorist camps in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK). This operation, in multiple stages, neutralized numerous terrorists and destroyed terror infrastructure and deep military assets, while avoiding civilian targets to prevent escalation. India's response extended beyond military action. Citing Pakistan's continued support for terrorism, India announced a review of the Indus Waters Treaty, a significant diplomatic move to hold the terrorists and their sponsors accountable.

The operation inflicted devastating losses on Pakistan's terrorist and military infrastructure, destroying its

key hubs. Reeling from the damage, the Director General (Military Operation) of Pakistan pleaded for a ceasefire, which was announced on May 12, 2025, by the Government of India without any external intervention. India made it clear that it acted without pressure and would continue to exercise its right to protect its people, territory, motherland, and sovereignty, thus redefining its policy and stance against any terrorist activity stating, "Every act of terror will be treated as an act of war."

Named after the sacred vermilion mark, 'Sindoar' symbolizing strength and honor, it was a tribute to the widows and families of the Pahalgam victims who lost their loved ones. With women officers as the face of the operation and standing at the forefront, it showcased the growing role of women in India's armed forces and embodied India's fierce determination to protect the motherland.

India's sophisticated defence capabilities were showcased during Operation Sindoar. The Indian armed forces used loitering munitions, SCALP air-to-ground missiles, and BrahMos supersonic cruise missiles to precisely target terror launchpads. Indian airspace was protected when Pakistan's retaliatory drone attacks were tackled by the home-grown AkashTeer Air Defence System, and a protective barrier was guaranteed by the S-400 Air Defence System. Pakistan's naval assets were cornered by the Indian Navy's stealth frigates in the Arabian Sea, demonstrating multi-domain dominance. The operation's success in dismantling terror networks and asserting India's reach set a new benchmark for counter terrorism.

As the armed forces carried out their mission with precision and courage, every corner of the country rallied behind them - irrespective of region, religion, or political belief. Through candlelight vigils and national prayers, Indians demonstrated that violence cannot break the country's spirit. A strong message was reinforced by the solidarity shown during Operation Sindoar: when its sovereignty and humanity are threatened, India stands as one - with its soldiers, and for its people.

# *Beyond the Clock*

## TIME TRAVEL

Time travel has always been a source of wonder and curiosity for people. Have you ever wished you could travel to your past to change something or to your future to glimpse your destiny? While some claim to have experienced time travel, and others propose theories about it, the true nature of time travel remains uncertain. In 1895, author H.G. Wells published his groundbreaking novel 'The Time Machine,' which brought the concept of time travel into public discussion. In the book, Wells explains that space is traditionally understood to have three dimensions: length, breadth and thickness. However, he suggests that time should be considered the fourth dimension, orthogonal to the three spatial dimensions. He argues that our consciousness moves along this time dimension from the beginning to the end of our lives, much like how we move through space. Although this was a work of science fiction, it inspired several philosophers and physicists, leading to the publication of many research papers.

Broadly, there are two types of time travel: traveling to the future and traveling to the past. The scientific explanations and theories of traveling to the future are derived from Einstein's theory of Special

Relativity. Prior to this, it was believed that time is constant everywhere. Isaac Newton stated that the flow of time is the same on Earth as it is in space. However, Einstein introduced the concept of time dilation, which states that the flow of time depends on speed and gravitational force. If an object is moving at a very high speed, time would pass more slowly for that object relative to a stationary observer.

In 1971, the Hafele–Keating experiment was conducted in which atomic clocks were flown around the world, showing time differences compared to those on the ground. It's not that time is slowing down; rather, time is a relative concept. Theoretically, if there were a rocket that could move at the speed of light, we could travel to the future. However, such advanced technology has not yet been developed. Russian astronaut Gennady Padalka, who holds the record for the most cumulative time spent in space, totalling 878 days, experienced a time dilation effect of approximately 0.02 seconds. NASA astronaut Scott Kelly, who spent nearly a year aboard the International Space Station, had his age measured upon his return to Earth. It was found to be approximately 5 milliseconds less compared to his twin brother's age. This illustrates the time dilation.

Until now, we have explored several methods and theories about traveling to the future. But is time travel to the past really possible? Well, theoretically speaking, Einstein's theory of relativity does not disprove time travel to the past. There is a way to create a wormhole, as suggested by Nobel Prize winning physicist Kip Thorne, who proposed that creating a wormhole could allow us to reach our past.

Traveling to the past presents many paradoxes. The famous one is the Grandfather Paradox: If I travelled into the past and killed my own grandfather, what would define my existence and actions? This is also explained by the theory of the multiverse, which claims that when a change occurs in the timeline, it splits into two universes. In one universe, I was born, travelled to the past, and killed my grandfather from another universe. Hence, I am alive in one universe while I do not exist in another.

In conclusion, I would say that time travel to the future is supported by scientific principles and evidence, whereas time travel to the past remains speculative and fraught with logical and physical challenges. But this curiosity to unravel the truth would never die, and the research would be continued.

# BRIDGE

Amid the towering cliffs and deep valleys of Jammu and Kashmir's Reasi district, a steel giant stretches across the turbulent Chenab River. It gleams under the mountain sun, standing not only as a marvel of modern engineering but also as a symbol of India's unwavering determination to bring connectivity to even its most isolated regions. This is the Chenab Railway Bridge, the world's highest railway bridge and one of the most ambitious infrastructure projects in Indian history. Towering 359 meters above the riverbed, the bridge surpasses even the height of Eiffel Tower and connects the villages of Bakkal and Kauri, forming a critical link in the Udhampur Srinagar Baramulla Rail Link (USBRL), a project that aims to provide all-weather rail connectivity to the Kashmir Valley.


But behind the numbers lies a saga of extraordinary effort the one that spans decades, involves some of the world's most challenging terrain, and represents a rare fusion of engineering precision, geopolitical urgency, and human perseverance. The dream of connecting Kashmir with the rest of India via railway

dates back to the early 2000s. For decades, the valley remained cut off during winters due to snow-blocked roads and avalanche-prone mountain passes. The USBRL project, conceived in 2002, envisioned a 272-kilometers railway line from Udhampur to Baramulla, traversing the rugged Pir Panjal terrain and providing a lifeline for the regional economy, healthcare, tourism, and defense logistics. One of the most formidable challenges in this project was crossing the deep gorge of the Chenab River, a natural barrier over 1,000 feet deep and nearly 500 meters wide. The site demanded a bridge unlike anything India had ever attempted — one capable of withstanding high seismic activity, fierce wind speeds, and temperature extremes ranging from +45°C to -20°C, all in a landscape where flat ground was nowhere to be found. Thus was born the idea of the Chenab Railway Bridge, an arch steel bridge that would not only carry trains but also carry the weight of an entire region's aspirations.


The bridge lies in Seismic Zone IV, with many parts bordering Zone V: the highest-risk category in India. The geology

includes fractured rocks, frequent landslides, and slope instability. To counter these, extensive geological mapping, rock bolting, grouting, and micro-piling techniques were deployed to stabilize the foundations. The two ends of the arch sit on specially engineered rock beds, with massive foundations bored as deep as 40 meters into the mountain. Real-time geotechnical monitoring was conducted using 3D geoscanning, LiDAR, and drone surveys to ensure every centimeter of terrain was understood before steel met stone. The bridge is designed to withstand wind speed upto 266 km/h. Engineers used wind tunnel testing in Germany to simulate the effect of gusts, turbulence, and vibration on both the structure and the trains passing over it. The design was then refined using computational fluid dynamics (CFD) models. Additionally, a wind monitoring system continuously collects data through sensors embedded in the structure, triggering alarms and halting train operations if speeds exceed safe thresholds. The bridge's most striking feature is its 467-meters span arch, that was built using a method known as the incremental cantilevering technique. Two massive cable cranes, mounted on either side of the gorge, lifted and placed steel segments weighing up to 100 tonnes. These segments were bolted and welded on site, while suspended at terrifying heights. Specialized teams worked in harnesses, balancing precision with safety, sometimes battling freezing temperatures and high-altitude winds. The Chenab Bridge is built using 63,000 metric tonnes of steel, much of it weathering steel, which forms a protective layer to resist corrosion in the humid, high-altitude environment. The piers and arch are blast-resistant, based on consultation with the Defense Research and Development Organization (DRDO), making the bridge capable of surviving potential terrorist attacks. The total cost of the project has been estimated at over 1,400 crores (approx. \$170 millions).

The Chenab Bridge has been constructed by Konkan Railway Corporation Ltd. (KRCL), in collaboration with Afcons Infrastructure and international consultants. Over 1,300 workers and 300 engineers, including many from Germany and Finland, worked tirelessly, sometimes in dangerous conditions, through snowfall, landslides, and political tensions. The Chenab Bridge is not just a technical marvel; its a strategic lifeline. For the Indian armed forces, it offers a faster, more reliable route for the movement of troops, artillery, and supplies to the northern frontiers. This enhances India's defense preparedness in the sensitive border regions of Jammu and Kashmir, and Ladakh. Economically, the USBRL and the Chenab Bridge will be transformative. Regions that were earlier cut off for months during winter will now enjoy year-round access. This will facilitate the flow of local products, apples, saffron, handicrafts to national and international markets and boost tourism, education, and employment. The Kashmir Valley, known for its breathtaking landscapes, could soon welcome luxury trains and eco-tourism circuits. Initially, opened for trials on June 20, 2024, it was inaugurated on June 6, 2025. The Chenab Railway Bridge, more than steel, concrete, and rivets, is a testament to what India can achieve when technology, vision, and national willpower converge.



As trains begin to thunder across its span and passengers gaze down into the deep gorge of the Chenab, they are not merely witnessing a marvel of engineering — they are part of a story. A story of audacity, resilience, and the relentless pursuit of progress. This is more than a bridge; it is a triumph carved in steel and stone. It carries with it the spirit of a nation determined to rise above every challenge.





# Maha Kumbh

## 2025

Where Devotion Meets the Divine Flow



**Maha Kumbh 2025**, often referred to as Mahakumbh, held at the sacred city of Prayagraj, Uttar Pradesh, emerged as the most awe-inspiring religious gathering of the modern era. Rooted in millennia-old tradition, this edition of Mahakumbh was not only a profound spiritual event but also a marvel of planning, infrastructure, and cultural diplomacy. Occurring once every 12 years at each of the four locations—Prayagraj, Haridwar, Nashik, and Ujjain, the Mahakumbh 2025 stood out because it aligned with rare planetary configurations, making it spiritually more significant than previous iterations. This elevated its status to a once-in-a-lifetime event, attracting an estimated 400 million devotees from across India and around the world. The mythology behind the Kumbh Mela adds to its sanctity. It is said that during the celestial churning of the ocean (Samudra Manthan) by the gods and demons, a pot of nectar (amrit) emerged. In the struggle that ensued, drops of this nectar fell at four earthly locations—Prayagraj being one of them. Pilgrims believe that bathing in the holy rivers at these locations during specific astrological alignments can cleanse one of sins and offer liberation (moksha). Prayagraj holds a special place as it is the site of the Triveni Sangam, the confluence of the Ganga, Yamuna, and the mystical Saraswati. This makes the act of taking a dip here during Mahakumbh supremely sacred.


The spiritual fervour that enveloped Mahakumbh 2025 was unmatched. Beginning on January 13, 2025 and concluding on February 26, 2025, the festival revolved around a series of 'Shahi Snans' or royal bathing days. These included Paush Purnima, Makar Sankranti, Mauni Amavasya (considered the most auspicious), Basant Panchami, Maghi Purnima, and Maha Shivratri. On these days, a sea of humanity gathered before dawn to immerse themselves in the icy waters, led by revered Akharas and saints. Alongside the dips, Prayagraj buzzed with spiritual discourses, kirtans, yoga camps, and rituals that reflected India's rich devotional landscape. The magnitude of the event required massive planning. The government of Uttar Pradesh, in collaboration with central agencies, created a temporary city that could rival any modern urban center. Spanning

over 4,000 hectares, this tented township had over 150,000 tents, more than 150,000 toilets, and a network of roads, water pipelines, and sanitation facilities. Around 10,000 sanitation workers were deployed daily to maintain cleanliness. Approximately 360 special trains, expanded flight services to Prayagraj Airport, and 450 kilometres of upgraded roads ensured smooth transportation for millions. Nearly 2,000 hectares of parking areas were created to accommodate the influx of vehicles. To ensure safety and smooth conduct, a multi-layered security apparatus was put in place. Personnels from Uttar Pradesh Police, CRPF, NDRF, SDRF, and other paramilitary units worked tirelessly to prevent any untoward incident. A remarkable use of technology was witnessed: AI-enabled surveillance systems with over 2,700 cameras, drones monitoring the crowd and river activities, and facial recognition systems helped manage the vast population. A dedicated police app offered real-time assistance in multiple languages, showcasing the integration of tradition with tech-driven governance.

The Mahakumbh also carried enormous economic significance. Estimates suggested that it injected over Rs. 2 lakh crores into the local and state economy, through tourism, hospitality, transport, and small scale trade. Artisans, hoteliers, transport operators, and vendors experienced a boom in business. Cultural diplomacy was another feather in the cap of Mahakumbh 2025. Over 1.5 million international visitors arrived from countries such as the USA, UK, Germany, Japan, Australia, and Canada. A German tourist's reflection summed the fulfilment very well: "I may live in Europe, but my soul resides here."

Mahakumbh 2025, more than just a religious congregation, was about faith, unity, and the deep rooted spiritual ethos of India. It was a living manifestation of India's cultural continuity and administrative evolution. It showed that with the right blend of faith, planning, and public participation, even the most ancient traditions can thrive in modern times. The Mahakumbh didn't just touch lives—it elevated them. As India marches into the future, this confluence of divinity and innovation will remain etched in memory as a beacon of unity, devotion, and resilience.

# भारत का सांस्कृतिक पुनर्जागरण

भारत विश्व की उन प्राचीनतम और समृद्ध सभ्यताओं में से एक है, जिसकी सांस्कृतिक परंपराएँ, दार्शनिक दृष्टिकोण और वैज्ञानिक उपलब्धियाँ आज भी मानवता के लिए प्रेरणाप्रोत हैं। सिंधु-सरवती सभ्यता (3300 ई.पू.) की मुख्यवस्थित नगर योजना, जल निकासी प्रणाली और धातु-शिल्प कौशल से लेकर वैदिक युग के वैचारिक उत्कर्ष, मौर्य साम्राज्य की राजनीतिक संगठन क्षमता, गुप्त युग के विज्ञान और कला के स्वरूप, और मध्यकालीन भारत की स्थापत्य कला—ये सभी हमारे गौरवशाली इतिहास के संतंभ हैं। यह अतीत के बीते हुए समय की स्मृति नहीं, बल्कि हमारी सांस्कृतिक आत्मा का जीवंत प्रतिरिंब है।

सांस्कृतिक जागरण का आशय केवल प्राचीन ग्रंथों और कलाओं को संग्रहालयों में संरक्षित करने तक सीमित नहीं है, बल्कि उस चेतना को पुनः जाग्रत करना है जिसने भारत को “विश्वगुरु” का ढर्जा दिलाया था। हमारे इतिहास में ऐसे असंख्य उदाहरण हैं, जहाँ भारतीय ज्ञान और सांस्कृति ने विश्व को नई दिशा दी। प्राचीन विश्वविद्यालय नालंदा और तक्षशिला के बीच शिक्षा संस्थान नहीं थे, बल्कि अंतर्राष्ट्रीय बौद्धिक संवाद के केंद्र थे, जहाँ चीन, कोरिया, जापान, मंगोलिया, श्रीलंका और तिब्बत के विद्वान अध्ययन के लिए आते थे। नालंदा में एक समय 10,000 से अधिक

विद्यार्थी और लगभग 2,000 आचार्य विद्या प्रदान करते थे, और वहाँ का पुस्तकालय “धर्मगंज” उस युग का सबसे विशाल ज्ञानकोश था।

विज्ञान और गणित में भी भारत का योगदान असाधारण रहा है। आर्यभट्ट ने शून्य और दशमलव पद्धति की अवधारणा दी, जिससे आधुनिक गणित और कंप्यूटर विज्ञान की नींव पड़ी। भास्करगाचार्य ने 12वीं शताब्दी में ग्रहों की गति की गणना ऐसी सटीकता से की, जो आधुनिक खगोलशास्त्र के लिए चाहिए करने वाली थी। सुश्रुत ने 300 से अधिक शल्य-क्रियाओं और 120 प्रकार के शल्य उपकरणों का वर्णन किया, जिससे आधुनिक चिकित्सा विज्ञान को दिशा मिली। दर्शनशास्त्र में उपनिषद, भगवद्गीता और बौद्ध व जैन ग्रंथों ने मानवता को आत्मज्ञान, करुणा और अहिंसा का संदेश दिया।

द्विर्भाव्यवश, आधुनिक समय में हमारी शिक्षा प्रणाली में इतिहास को केवल तथ्यों और वर्षों की नीरस सूची के रूप में प्रस्तुत किया जाता है, जिससे युवा पीढ़ी अपने गौरवपूर्ण अंतीत की आत्मा से अनभिज्ञ रह जाती है। सांस्कृतिक जागरण के लिए आवश्यक है कि इतिहास को प्रेरणाप्रोत और आत्मबोध के साधन के रूप में प्रस्तुत किया जाए, ताकि यह केवल परीक्षा उत्तीर्ण करने का विषय न रहकर, जीवन जीने की दिशा देने

वाला प्रकाशस्तंभ बन सके। इसके लिए ऐतिहासिक स्थलों और स्मारकों का वैज्ञानिक संरक्षण, प्राचीन पांडुलिपियों का डिजिटलीकरण, लौकिकला और हस्तशिल्प को पुनर्जीवित करना, तथा भारतीय भाषाओं और साहित्य का संरक्षण अनिवार्य है। जब हमारी सांस्कृतिक जड़ों को आधुनिक तकनीक और वैश्विक दृष्टिकोण के साथ जोड़ा जाएगा, तभी हम एक संशक्त और आत्मविश्वासी राष्ट्र के रूप में उभरेंगे। यह संतुलन हमें न केवल हमारी पहचान बनाए रखने में मदद करेगा, बल्कि हमें विश्व मंच पर नेतृत्व की भूमिका निभाने के योग्य भी बनाएगा।

स्वामी विवेकानन्द ने कहा था—“एक राष्ट्र जो अपनी संस्कृति को भूल जाता है, वह नष्ट हो जाता है।” यह चेतावनी केवल अतीत के लिए नहीं, बल्कि आने वाले समय के लिए भी उतनी ही प्रासंगिक है। इतिहास हमें गिखाता है कि कोई भी सभ्यता तब तक जीवित और प्रगतिशील रहती है जब तक वह अपनी जड़ों से जुड़ी रहती है। भारत का सांस्कृतिक पुनर्जागरण केवल अतीत का गौरव गान नहीं है, बल्कि एक ऐसी नींव है जिस पर हम भविष्य की भव्य इमारत खड़ी कर सकते हैं। संस्कृति हमारी आत्मा है और इतिहास उसका दर्पण; जब हम इस दर्पण में इमानदारी से देखते हैं, तो हमें अपने होने का सच्चा अर्थ और दिशा दोनों मिल जाते हैं।

# कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता बनाम मानवीय संवेदना

विज्ञान और प्रौद्योगिकी के अप्रत्याशित विकास ने आज मानव-समाज को ऐसे मोड़ पर लाकर खड़ा कर दिया है जहाँ एक और अनगिनत संभावनाएँ हैं, तो ढूसरी ओर नैतिक व मानवीय संकटों की छाया भी विद्यमान है। वर्तमान युग को यंत्रयुग अथवा डिजिटल युग कहा जाना अतिशयोक्ति नहीं होगी। इस यंत्रयुग का सर्वाधिक शक्तिशाली औजार है कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता, जिसने मनुष्य को अकल्पनीय गति, सुविधा और निर्णय क्षमता प्रदान की है। परन्तु प्रश्न यह है क्या यह कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता मनुष्य की संवेदनशीलता और नैतिक विवेक का स्थान ले सकती है?

कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता का अभिप्राय है, ऐसी प्रणाली का निर्माण, जो मनुष्य के समान तर्क करे, सीख सके, और स्वायत्त निर्णय ले सके। आज चिकित्सा, परिवहन, शिक्षण, सूचना प्रसारण, न्यायिक प्रक्रिया, यहाँ तक कि रचनात्मक लेखन और चित्रकला जैसे क्षेत्रों में भी AI का प्रयोग किया जा रहा है। इसकी सहायता से कार्यों की गति में तीव्रता आई है, त्रुटियाँ न्यूनतम हुई हैं, और कई संकटों का समाधान भी संभव हुआ है। निःसंदेह, यह मानव मस्तिष्क की विलक्षण उपलब्धि है।

किन्तु ढूसरी ओर, मानवीय संवेदना वह तत्व है जो मनुष्य को केवल सौचने वाला ही नहीं, अनुभव करने वाला प्राणी भी

बनाता है। संवेदना में कलण, सहानुभूति, दया, नैतिक विवेक तथा आत्मीयता जैसे तत्व समाविष्ट होते हैं जो किसी भी निर्णय या व्यवहार को मूल्यबोध और नैतिकता से संपन्न करते हैं। एक चिकित्सक का रोगी के प्रति व्यवहार, एक शिक्षक का छात्र के प्रति समर्पण, एक न्यायाधीश का संवेदनशील निर्णय, या एक कवि की आत्मा से निकली कविता ये सभी कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता के लिए केवल डेटा या सूचना मात्र हो सकते हैं, परन्तु मनुष्य के लिए ये जीवन के कामलतम अनुभव हैं।

यह यहीं से संघर्ष प्रारंभ होता है, बुद्धिमत्ता बनाम संवेदना का संघर्ष। क्या कोई यंत्र सही और गलत के बीच नैतिक अंतर कर सकता है? क्या कोई मशीन यह अनुभव कर सकती है कि किसी शब्द से किसी हृदय को कितना दृश्य या सान्त्वना मिल सकती है? कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता आंकड़ों और तर्कों पर कार्य करती है, परन्तु वह प्रसंग, संवेदन, संस्कार, और सांख्यकीय अनुशीलन को नहीं आत्मसात कर सकती। उदाहरणस्वरूप, एक कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता प्रणाली किसी अपराधी को सजा तो दे सकती है, परंतु उसके जीवन की पृष्ठभूमि, उसके सामाजिक-सांख्यकीय संघर्ष, और उसके पश्चाताप को नहीं समझ सकती।

आज अनेक पारंपरिक मानवीय व्यवसायों में कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता का हस्तक्षेप तीव्र गति से बढ़

रहा है। यह निःसंदेह उत्पादकता बढ़ाता है, परंतु क्या यह संबंधों की ऊज्ज्वलता और मूल्य की गहराई को प्रतिस्थापित कर सकता है? किसी वृद्धजन के लिए एक ढेखरेख करने वाला शोबोट उसकी शारीरिक आवश्यकताओं की पूर्ति कर सकता है, परंतु क्या वह उसकी पीढ़ियों की समृद्धियों, अकेलेपन और प्रेम की आकांक्षा को समझ सकता है?

कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता और मानवीय संवेदना को एक-ढूसरे के विरोधी नहीं, बल्कि पूरक बनाना ही आज का सबसे बड़ा बौद्धिक और नैतिक दायित्व है। नीति-निर्माण, शिक्षण पद्धति, स्वास्थ्य व्यवस्था, और प्रशासन जैसे क्षेत्रों में कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता के साथ-साथ मानव-केंद्रित संवेदनशील दृष्टिकोण को बनाए रखना अनिवार्य है। कृत्रिम बुद्धिमत्ता निःसंदेह आधुनिक युग की अनुपम उपलब्धि है, परंतु मनुष्य की असली शक्ति उसकी संवेदनशीलता में निहित है। यंत्रों का युग चाहे जितनी गति प्रदान कर दे, परंतु जीवन की गहराई, संबंधों की ऊज्ज्वलता, और आत्मा की गूँज केवल एक मनुष्य ही अनुभव कर सकता है। हमें विज्ञान और संवेदना के बीच संतुलन स्थापित करना होगा, तभी यह यंत्रयुग मनुष्य के लिए कल्याणकारी सिद्ध होगा। अन्यथा यह बुद्धिमत्ता संवेदनाओं को विस्मृत कर एक शून्य समाज की ओर ले जा सकती है।

साहित्य समाज का ढर्पण होता है। वह समय की मानसिकता, सांस्कृतिक मल्य तथा सामाजिक संरचना को शैब्दकृप में परिव्यक्त करता है। प्रत्येक युग में, साहित्य ने उन भावनाओं को स्वर प्रदान किया है, जो कदाचित् समाज में कभी विग्रीध, कभी स्त्रीकार तथा कभी प्रतिरोध के रूप में अंतर्भित रही हैं। अतः जब हम हिन्दी साहित्य का अनुशीलन करते हैं, तो उसमें केवल भाषा का विकास ही नहीं अपितु समाज की चित्तवृत्तियों का क्रमशः परिवर्तन भी परिलक्षित होता है। स्त्री की प्रतिमा भी इसी साहित्यिक प्रवाह में निर्मित हुई है आरंभ में वह देवीस्वरूपा के रूप में पूजित हुई, तत्पश्चात् प्रेम की प्रेरणा बनी, और फिर त्याग तथा सहिष्णुता की मूर्ति के रूप में चित्रित की गई। परंतु प्रश्न यह उठता है कि क्या उसे कभी स्वतंत्र चिन्तन करने वाले मानव के रूप में मान्यता प्राप्त हुई? यही प्रश्न हमें स्त्री-विमर्श की दिशा में अग्रसर करता है।

प्रारम्भिक हिन्दी साहित्य में स्त्री की भूमिका सीमित एवं संयमित रही। वह प्रकृष्ट रचनाकारों की दृष्टि से सुजित एक ऐसी प्रात्र रही, जो मनोहर, जीवंत, परंतु मौन रही। भक्तिकाव्य काल में मीरा बाई अपवादस्वरूप सम्पूर्णित होती हैं, परन्तु वहाँ भी उनकी स्वतंत्रता केवल आत्मिक मुक्ति तक सीमित प्रतीत होती है। तत्पश्चात् रीतिकाल में स्त्री का निरूपण केवल सौन्दर्य तथा श्रृंगार की वस्तु के रूप में हुआ। इस चिन्तन की गहनता तुलसीदास विवरित गमचित्तमानस के उत्तरकाण्ड में

लक्षण मुछा प्रसंग में द्रष्टव्य है—  
“जैहउँ अंवध कवन महुँ लाई।  
नारि हेतु प्रिय भाई गैवाई॥।  
बक अपजम सहतेउँ जग माहीं।  
नारि हानि बिसेष छुति नाहीं॥”

इसमें श्रीग्राम जी कहते हैं “पब्ली हेतु यदि मैं अपने प्रिय भ्राता को तिलांजलि ढे छूँ, तो अयोध्या किस मुख से जाऊँगी? स्वग्रह में कलंक सहना स्वीकार्य है, परन्तु जी की हानि को लाई विशेष प्रति नहीं माना जाता।” यह काव्य यद्यपि तुलसीदास जी द्वारा रचित है, तथापि यह उस काल की सामाजिक मानसिकता को उद्घाटित करता है, जहाँ स्त्री को एक परित्यज्य वस्तु के रूप में अभिहित किया गया था। यह दृष्टिकोण उस पितृसत्तात्मक वृत्ति का धीतक है, जिसमें पुरुष का यश, त्याग और वीरता, स्त्री की तुलना में अधिक महत्वपूर्ण माने जाते हैं। बीसवीं शताब्दी में जब साहित्य यथार्थवाद की ओर उन्मय हुआ, तब स्त्री पात्रों को भी नवीन आयाम प्राप्त होने लगे। प्रेमचन्द की ‘निर्मला’ जैसी रचनाएँ सामाजिक व्यवस्था पर प्रश्नचिह्न आगेपित करती हैं, तथापि स्त्री वहाँ भी मौन प्रतिरोध की प्रतीक बनी रहती है। इस कालखण्ड में जहाँ एक और कुछ साहित्यकारों ने स्त्री की पीड़ा को संवेदनात्मक गहराई से समझने का प्रयास किया, वहाँ कुछ रचनाओं में उसकी ‘त्यागमयी प्रतिमा’ को आदर्श के रूप में प्रतिष्ठित किया गया।

धर्मवीर भारती का उपन्यास ‘गुनाहों का देवता’ इसका उपयुक्त उदाहरण है। इस कृति की नायिका

चंद्रकांता प्रेम, आकांक्षाएँ एवं अधिकार सब कुछ त्याग देती है, और पाठक उसे महत्ता की दृष्टि से देखता है। यही वह दृष्टिकोण है, जिसमें स्त्री के सहिष्णुता एवं समर्पण को उसका ‘गुण’ माना जाता है। पुरुष दृष्टिकोण से रचित यह प्रात्र समाज की उस अवधारणा को सुहड़ करता है, जिसमें स्त्री का अस्तित्व ‘त्याग’ में ही निहित माना जाता है। इसके विपरीत, कांता भारती की कथा ‘रेत की मछली’ इस त्याग की धारणा को खुली चुनौती देती है। इसमें नायिका अपने स्वत्व एवं अधिकारों की स्पष्ट उद्घोषणा करती है। समकालीन साहित्य में स्त्री-विमर्श अब केवल समानता की ही नहीं, अपितु विविधता की भी बात करता है। यह विमर्श अब केवल ‘नारीवाद’ नहीं, अपितु समग्र मनस्यता का आनंदोलन बन चुका है।

अन्ततः, स्त्री-विमर्श साहित्य की वह प्रवाहमान धारा है, जो केवल स्त्रियों के लिए नहीं, अपितु सम्पूर्ण समाज के मानसिक स्वास्थ्य एवं नैतिक संतुलन के लिए अनिवार्य है। यह कोई संघर्ष नहीं, कोई प्रतिशोध नहीं, अपितु मानव की मानव की माँग है। जब तक समाज स्त्री को चिन्तन, चयन एवं जीवन के समस्त आयामों में पूर्ण अधिकार प्रदान नहीं करता, तब तक साहित्य में यह स्वर अनिवार्य रूप से गुंजायमान रहेगा। क्योंकि साहित्य का ध्येय केवल सौन्दर्य-प्रस्तुति नहीं, अपितु सत्य के उद्घोष का साहस होता है और स्त्री-विमर्श वही साहस है, जिसकी आज भी नितान्त आवश्यकता है।

# आत्मबल की यात्रा: भय से स्वत्व तक

किसी भी कठिन कार्य को प्रारंभ करने से पूर्व, हमारे भीतर अनायास ही यह विचार जन्म लेता है - "नहीं हो पाएगा। यह नकारात्मकता हमारी अंतर्शक्ति पर एक अंतरिक आघात की भाँति होती है। यह भय केवल एक भाव नहीं, बल्कि संभावनाओं की हत्या करने वाला भाव है। शमधारी सिंह 'दिनकर' द्वारा रचित महाकाव्य 'रश्मिरथी' की यह पंक्तियाँ इसी विचारधारा पर प्रकाश डालती हैं कि जीवन में कुछ भी न कर पाने का उत्तर, किसी हार से कहीं अधिक घातक होता है:

"जो तुफानों में ग़ाह निकालें  
जो पर्वतों से टकराएँ।  
सूर्य नमस्कार करे उनको  
जो जीवन पथ पर उत्तर जाएँ।"

यह पंक्तियाँ केवल कविता नहीं, अपितु जीवन का दर्शन हैं। ये इस बात की पुष्टि करती हैं कि साहस का संबंध सबसे बड़ा शत्रु भय नहीं, बल्कि उस भय के सामने झुक जाना है। सम्पूर्ण ब्रह्मांड की दिव्य शक्ति हमारे मन के भीतर निवास करती है। तब यह सोच लेना कि "हमसे नहीं होगा" क्या यह हमारी आत्मिक सामर्थ्य, संभावनाओं और विश्वास का अपमान नहीं? मनुष्य का मन इतना बलवान होता है कि विषमतम परिस्थितियों में भी वह जीवन को दिशा दे सकता है। जब पीड़ा को कोई उद्देश्य मिल जाता है, तब वह पीड़ा मात्र वेदना नहीं रहती वह जीवन का सार बन जाती है।

भारतीय संस्कृति के स्वतंत्रता संग्राम की गांथाएँ इस तथ्य की जीती जागती मिसाल हैं। जब उस काल में लोगों ने अपने जीवन का अर्थ नहीं खोया, तो आज हमारी आत्म इच्छाशक्ति पर संदेह करना उन आत्माओं की तपस्या, निष्ठा और बलिदान का अपमान होगा। हम वही बनते हैं, जो हम अपने मन में सोचते हैं। आत्मबल की अनुपस्थिति में सबसे बड़ा संकट यह होता है कि हम अपनी ही पीड़ा के योग्य नहीं बन पाते। मनुष्य के लिए यह सबसे कठिन और भयावह स्थिति होती है। क्योंकि हर पीड़ा, हर संघर्ष, मन में उठते अनिग्नित प्रश्नों का प्रतिबिंब होती है जो हमारे आत्मबल को चुनौती देते हैं।

परिस्थितियों के प्रति अपने टष्टिकोण को चुनने की स्वतंत्रता है। यही टष्टिकोण जीवन को नवीन ऊर्जा और उत्साह से भर देता है। यदि कोई जानता है कि उसे 'क्यों' जीना है, तो वह 'कैसे' जीना है यह भी जान लेता है। यह विचार हमें न केवल स्थायित्व देता है, बल्कि विपरीत परिस्थितियों में भी हमारी आत्मा को ढढ़ बनाए रखता है। जब हम सोचते हैं कि हम नहीं कर सकते, तब हम अपने ही इतिहास के साथ अव्याय करते हैं उस संघर्षशील परंपरा के साथ जिसने अपनी ढढ़ निश्चय शक्ति, आत्मसंयम और साहस से पूरे संसार को छुकने पर विवश कर दिया। आँखों में आँख होना कोई शर्म की बात नहीं होती। ये आँखें इस बात की गवाही देते हैं कि हमने दर्द सहा है, और उसमें भी साहस की ज्योति जलाए रखी है। जो गोते हैं वे कमजोर नहीं होते वे वेदना से भी रिश्ता निभाने की हिम्मत रखते हैं। वे संवेदनशीलता के साथ जीवन के हर क्षण को पूर्णता से जीते हैं।

अतः आवश्यकता है कि हम अपने भीतर की शक्ति को यहचानें। आत्मबल की उस लौकी को कभी मंद न होने दें, जो हमें हर विफलता के बाद पुनः खड़ा करती है। हमें उस उत्तर को पीछे छोड़ना होगा जो हमें हमारे ही उद्देश्य से ढूँढ़ करता है। क्योंकि अंतिम सत्य यही है, मनुष्य वही बनता है, जो वह अपने मन में ठान लेता है।

# नैतिक निहिलवाद

नैतिक निहिलवाद एक ऐसी दार्शनिक विचारधारा है जिससे यढ़ने समझने के पश्चात जीवन के प्रति हमारा दृष्टिकोण पुर्णतः बदल जाता है। यह विचारधारा बचपन से हमारे “सही-गलत”, “अच्छा-बुरा”, “स्वर्ग-नरक” की ब्रह्म एवं हृषि सोच को मर्माहित कर देती है। कदाचित यह हमारी आदिग, अडिग, परंपरागत विचारधारा को न बदले, परंतु इकलौतुर ज़रूर देगी। विषय यह है कि क, ख, ग से लेकर “साँवला रंग- ढबा हुआ”, “गोरा रंग-माफ”, कोयल की आवाज़ सुरीली, कौरे की बेकार, यह सब हमें प्रशिक्षित किया गया है न कि कोई स्वयं जन्मा हआ विचार, तो संभवतः चौरी-निकृष्ट, ईमानदारी-सर्वश्रेष्ठ, एक अश्वेषिता स्त्री पवित्र और एक वेश्या-चरित्रहीन, यह सब भी हमारी बनाई हुई किंवदंती है जो समाज में केवल इसलिए स्वीकृत है क्योंकि हमारी यंत्रवत अधिकांश जनसंख्या ने इसे मान लिया।

नैतिक निहिलवाद पर अनेक प्रयिद्ध विचारकों, दर्शनशास्त्रियों ने लिखा और बताया। फ्रेडरिक नीत्शे उसमें से एक थे, नीत्शे एक जर्मन दार्शनिक थे जिनका मानना था कि परंपरागत नैतिक मूल्यों (जैसे सही-गलत, पुण्य-पाप, ईश्वर-धर्म) को इसानों ने स्वयं बनाया है, यह कोई सार्वभौमिक या द्विव्य सत्य नहीं है। और जब हमारी “अच्छा-बुरा” की किंवदंती धारणाएँ बह जाती हैं तो हममें नीलता जब्ज लेती है, परंतु नीलता अर्थात् शून्यता कोई विक्तता नहीं, संभावनाओं की गहराई है। मेरे विचार से

शून्यता एक स्वतंत्रता है जो हमें औतिमानव बनाती है, जब हम अपने सारे विचार, सारी धारणाएँ, नैतिक मूल्यों को स्वयं बनाते हैं न कि किसी परंपरा के आधार पे।

नैतिक निहिलवाद इस विचार को चुनौती देता है कि नैतिकता कोई ईश्वरीय आदेश या सार्वभौमिक सत्य है। वह दर्शाता है कि नैतिक मान्यताएँ वास्तव में सामाजिक, संस्कृतिक और ऐतिहासिक संदर्भों पर निर्भर करती हैं, न कि किसी शाश्वत नियम पर। जिसे एक संस्कृति में पुण्य माना गया, वही दूसरी में अपराध हो सकती है। उदाहरणस्वरूप, हिजाब को एक समाज में धार्मिक आस्था और मर्यादा का प्रतीक माना जाता है, तो दूसरे में स्त्री की स्वतंत्रता पर लगाया गया बंधन। समलैंगिकता, जो एक प्रगतिशील समाज में प्रेम का क्रृप है, वही किसी कृदिवाढ़ी व्यवस्था में अपराध की श्रेणी में आता है। भारत में सती प्रथा कभी धार्मिक पुण्य मानी जाती थी, जबकि आज उसे एक अमानवीय कृत्य माना जाता है। गोहत्या कहीं परंपरा का हिस्सा है, तो कहीं वह धार्मिक भावना का उल्लंघन। नैतिक निहिलवाद यह स्पष्ट करता है कि इन सबकी नैतिक व्याख्याएँ किसी उच्च नैतिक सत्ता से नहीं आतीं, बल्कि मानवीय समाज की सहमति, परंपरा और प्रयोजन से निर्मित होती हैं।

यह विचारधारा अनैतिकता की ओर नहीं, बल्कि स्वनिर्मित और उत्तरदायी नैतिकता की ओर

उन्मुख करती है, एक ऐसी नैतिकता जो न तो धार्मिक भय से उत्पन्न होती है, न ही किसी परंपरागत आदेश से, बल्कि हमारी अंतराला और दूसरों की पीड़ा की प्रत्यक्ष अनुभूति से प्रेरित होती है। जब हम यह स्वीकार कर लेते हैं कि “अच्छा-बुरा” का कोई सार्वभौमिक मापदंड नहीं है, तब हमारे पास यह अवसर होता है कि हम स्वयं विश्वेषण करें और ऐसी नैतिकता गढ़ें जो कलण, विवेक और व्याय पर आधारित हो।

नैतिक निहिलवाद को अलग तरीके से समझना चाहें तो प्रयिद्ध लेखक भयोंद्र सिंह खिड़वाड़िया के विचारों से समझना आसान होगा। जैसे किसी का सच उतना सच नहीं, जितना वो बताता है, और न ही किसी का झूठ उतना झूठा जितना हम समझ बैठते हैं, जैसे चोर उतना धन नहीं ले जाते जितना अङ्गबांगों में छपता है, और लुटने वालों पर उससे ज्यादा गुज़रती है जितना हमें दिखाई देता है। परमात्मा उतना शक्तिशाली भी नहीं जितना श्रद्धालुओं ने कहा, और न उतना कमज़ार जितना नास्तिकों को लगता रहा। जैसे इतिहास ठीक वैसा कभी नहीं था जैसा पढ़ाया गया और न भविष्य वैसा होगा जैसी कल्पनाएँ मस्तिष्क में रख ली। तो जैसे इन सभी के उत्तर कहीं बीच में हैं वैसे ही हर चीज़ शायद औचित्ययुक्त है और सही और गलत के बीच में। और इसी प्रकार वास्तविक सत्य भी कहीं बीच में है, नीत्शे की विचारधारा भी और शायद इस अनुच्छेद का अनुगान भी।

अरिहंत है नावकीर्तिकारी जिसने अमिट विश्वाश बाँधा,


वो हम ही थे जिसने दिसम्बर चार का इतिहास साधा॥

## *An Enigmatic Ensemble*

# **CODERS AND DEVELOPERS CLUB**

To deepen first-year students' grasp of CP and Data Structures & Algorithms, CDC organized "Syntax Siege" from March 07, 2025 to March 15, 2025. This week-long program, attended by over 700 students, combined in-depth lectures and a competitive finale to motivate participants towards excellence.

The club concluded its calendar with an Induction Drive on March 29, 2025, employing a rigorous three-stage selection process to onboard passionate and skilled new members.

The Coders and Developers Club continues to be a beacon of technical brilliance, inspiring students to excel both in competitions and their future careers.



# **COMPUTER ENGINEERING SOCIETY**

The Computer Engineering Society (CES), established in 1993, is one of the University's oldest and most active technical bodies, bringing together B.Tech. students passionate about technology, innovation, and personal growth. Dedicated to going beyond classroom learning, CES focuses on honing technical expertise while fostering overall personality development. Over the years, it has grown into a vibrant platform for students to learn, compete, and collaborate. For 2024–25, the Society operated under the guidance of Faculty Advisor Dr. Sushil Kumar Saroj, with President Manvendra Sharma leading its initiatives. The academic year began with Game of Codes on August 11, 2024, an online programming contest on HackerRank for sophomores. With over 150 participants, it provided an engaging opportunity to test problem-solving skills and coding proficiency. This was followed by Connoisseur on December 30, 2024, an online mentoring session conducted on Microsoft Teams. CES alumni interacted with over 180 freshmen, offering insights into coding practices, career guidance, and strategies for thriving in university life. In January 2025, CES hosted Code Crusade, a beginner-friendly competitive programming contest that introduced more than 250 first-year students to coding in a supportive environment, helping them build confidence and develop logical thinking. February witnessed the much-anticipated Capture the Flag (CTF) cybersecurity challenge, which tested participants' skills in cryptography, reverse engineering, and steganography. Attracting 487 competitors and generating over 30,000 submissions, it became one of the largest online security events on campus.


The highlight of the year was ENNEXUS, the Society's five-day annual tech fest held from April 08, 2025 to April 11, 2025. With 450+ participants, the fest featured events like Cludicode (cybersecurity treasure hunt), Código (offline programming contest), Wield the Web (web development competition), Flip Flop (partner code-switch challenge), Exacto (web cloning task), and Capture the Flag 2.0 (extended cybersecurity contest). Each event was designed to encourage teamwork, technical innovation, and creative problem-solving. Overall, 2024–25 was a year of growth and achievement for the Computer Engineering Society. Through its diverse range of events, the Society empowered students to strengthen their technical skills, explore new domains, and gain practical experience. With its continued commitment to innovation and excellence, CES remains a cornerstone of the University's technical culture.



# **CULTURAL SYNOD**

The year began with HEATS, the much-anticipated induction platform for first-year students. Held as a multi-genre cultural showcase, the event featured performances in drama, dance, music, and fine arts, evaluated by senior members on creativity, stage presence, and potential. In Pintura de Pilares, artists transformed campus pillars into vibrant works of art, adding color and imagination to everyday structures.

The Cultural Synod also took creativity beyond conventional events, organising flash mobs, street plays (Nukkad Natak), live musical sessions, dance performances, and digital art campaigns, spreading awareness and positivity both on and off campus. Cultural evenings were another highlight, with the Synod contributing to major university celebrations such as Foundation Day, Convocation, Alumni Meet, and New Year gatherings. A notable moment was the grand welcome for the NAAC peer team, featuring a fusion of music, dance, drama, and fine arts—earning appreciation for showcasing the university's cultural richness. The team also collaborated with The Editorial Board to present Abhyudaya, a four-day Art, Cultural and Literary festival that brought together diverse art forms and creative communities. Overall, 2024–25 was a year of energy, teamwork, and artistic growth for the Cultural Synod. Through its dedication to inclusivity, talent development, and cultural excellence, the Synod ensured that campus life remained engaging, memorable, and deeply connected to the university's creative spirit.



# **DRONE & IOT CLUB**

The Drone & IoT Club of Madan Mohan Malaviya University of Technology, established in 2023, has rapidly emerged as a hub for innovation, collaboration, and hands-on learning in unmanned systems and connected devices. Guided by its vision to pioneer practical solutions in drone and IoT technologies, the club empowers its members to design, build, and deploy creative systems that address real-world challenges.

Membership expanded from 32 to 52 active participants, with members delivering 12 student-led prototypes and achieving notable success, including four competition wins at Technex, the national-level tech fest of IIT BHU. The year began with the Club Inaugural Meet and Orientation on July 10, 2024, which welcomed new members through project showcases and team-building activities. Freshmen gained early exposure to drone and IoT fundamentals and quickly formed teams that initiated three mini-projects during the session. This was followed by the flagship TechFusion Workshop held from April 29, 2024 to May 04, 2024, a multi-day immersive program covering graphic design for drone dashboards, multi-rotor frame assembly, fixed-wing aerodynamic simulation in XFLR5, robotics integration with microcontrollers, AI-based object detection using YOLOv5 and TensorFlow Lite, and IoT-enabled weather monitoring systems with cloud connectivity. Over 100 participants completed hands-on modules, building functional demos, with nearly all attendees rating the experience as highly impactful.

In December 2024, the club hosted SwiftWings '24, an inter-college fixed-wing drone competition where teams engineered wingspan-optimized models capable of over five minutes of stable flight and precision landings within a five-meter radius. February 2025 saw the Induction Members also benefit from lab visits and technical orientations, gaining firsthand experience with the UAV testing ground, ECE laboratories, and IoT prototyping setups, where they learned to operate equipment such as flight controllers, soldering stations, and RF modules. Looking forward, the club is set to advance into AI-powered obstacle-avoidance drone projects, pursue research publications in IEEE-affiliated journals, and collaborate with other student organizations to create multidisciplinary technology solutions. In just two years since its inception, the Drone & IoT Club has established itself as a vibrant, forward-thinking community, nurturing both technical expertise and collaborative spirit.



# **ELECTRICAL ENGINEERS' LEGATION**

The Electrical Engineers' Legation stands as the proud and esteemed departmental society of the Electrical Engineering branch. Over the years, it has emerged as a dynamic platform that not only fosters academic and technical excellence but also cultivates creativity, leadership, and camaraderie among students. The year's highlights included Literario, an online poetry event held from February 07, 2025 to February 14, 2025 on social media, showcasing participants' writing skills and emotional expression; Electronics Core Classes on February 24, 2025 to February 25, 2025, empowering first-year students with essential industry insights and technical knowledge through expert-led sessions; and the annual techno-cultural extravaganza Explora, held from March 30, 2025 to April 02, 2025. Explora featured diverse and engaging activities such as Electromaniac, a circuit design challenge for first-year students; SpielMinati, a group discussion and quick-thinking competition; Quantico, a clue-based treasure hunt; C-Quiz, an online C programming contest; Pictales, a photography and storytelling competition; and Roll the Reel, a short video event promoting social causes and showcasing editing skills.

These successful events reflect the enthusiasm, dedication, and talent of our students. Under the leadership of President Rishi Raj Upadhyay and Vice-President Vivek Kumar, ECES looks forward to continuing this tradition of excellence and providing more opportunities to nurture and showcase both artistic and technical abilities.



# **GOOGLE DEVELOPER GROUPS**

The Google Developer Groups on Campus, MMMUT (GDG-MMMUT), driven by its motto "Developing Together a Better Tomorrow", continued to be a dynamic platform for technical learning and collaboration during the 2024–25 session. Under the guidance of Faculty Advisor Dr. Rohit Kumar Tiwari and led by Secretary Aastha Gupta (IT, 3<sup>rd</sup> Year), the chapter organized a series of impactful events that blended skill development, community engagement, and industry exposure.

The year began with the Coding Ninjas' Freshmen Webinar & Quiz on September 30, 2024, featuring Microsoft SE-2 Kunal Jindal, which drew over 100 participants. In October, the flagship month-long Google Cloud Gen AI Study Jams saw 158 students explore cloud technologies, with 80 successfully completing all learning pathways and helping the chapter secure Tier 1 status in the program. The Orientation Program & Quiz on October 17, 2024, welcomed 189 first-year students, followed by DevXplore roadmap sessions in November covering Web, Android, Blockchain, AI/ML, and DSA/CP, engaging more than 300 participants.

December brought CodeRush-X, an exclusive two-round coding contest for first-year students, with 132 participants and cash prizes for the top three. In January 2025, the chapter hosted a Solution Challenge Info Session introducing students to the UN's Sustainable Development Goals. February featured the Native Nexus React Native workshop, where 120+ students built their first cross-platform apps, and UnReel, a three-week Instagram reel contest rewarding creative tech-themed content.

The year concluded with HackBlitz, a 12-hours offline hackathon in March 2025. Following an initial submission round, 35 shortlisted teams competed in the final prototype-building stage, with prizes awarded to the top performers and a special recognition for innovation.

Through this diverse calendar of events, GDG on Campus MMMUT strengthened its reputation as a vibrant community for budding developers, inspiring students to learn, build, and collaborate at the intersection of technology and creativity.



# **NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME**

Madan Mohan Malaviya University of Technology operates the National Service Scheme (NSS) Cell under its Dean of Extension, Field Outreach and Alumni Relations. NSS was officially established to promote community service among engineering students under the national motto "Not Me, But You." Dr. Awadhesh Kumar serves as Faculty Coordinator, leading initiatives to develop socially conscious engineers.

Event AAYANSH launched the 2024-25 session. CONSTITUTION DAY followed next. On October 24, 2024, AAYANSH was held at Malaviya Shiksha Niketan, sharing Diwali festivities with underprivileged children. Around 500 students participated in cyber security awareness by Gorakhpur SP Mr. Abhinav Tyagi, while the main program distributed 250 stationery kits, rangoli materials, and sweets. Constitution Day on November 26, 2025, featured Justice G.K. Pandey as chief guest, with competitions across rangoli (44 groups), painting (56 participants), and elocution (83 participants). Prof. V.K. Pandey administered constitutional oaths to 200 students, achieving 2000 online registrations, plus District Court visits for 30 students.

The NSS Cell conducted extensive educational outreach from November 2024 to February 2025, organizing campus visits for over 2,200 students from government institutions across Azamgarh, Basti, Ambedkar Nagar, Kushinagar, Deoria, and Sant Kabeer Nagar. Students explored engineering departments, laboratories, Central Library, and workshops, concluding with career counseling sessions. The Right to Information Workshop on January 28, 2025 featured Justice G.K. Pandey covering RTI Act 2005 and related provisions. World Cancer Day on February 04, 2025 included environmental awareness by alumni Er. M.P. Kandol and cancer awareness by Dr. Rajneesh Pandey.

March 07, 2025 witnessed "Padhe Vishwavidyalaya Bade Vishwavidyalaya" across 56 campus rooms, engaging 3,256 students, 140 faculty, 195 staff, and 328 village children, alongside "Dahej Mukt Bharat" and "Nasha Mukt Bharat" pledge ceremonies. The Cycle Yatra (March 24 to March 25, 2025) from MMMUT to Chauri Chaura combined environmental advocacy with freedom struggle commemoration, visiting Matrikuha Mata Devi Temple. Ambedkar Jayanti on April 14, 2025, featured the Dean of Faculty Affairs, Prof. U. C. Jaiswal, Registrar, Shri Chandra Prakash Priyadarshi, and Dr. Milind Raj Anand, concluding with a march to Ambedkar Bhavan.

NSS is committed to continuing these efforts for holistic student development in upcoming years.



# ROBOTICS CLUB

The Robotics Club of Madan Mohan Malaviya University of Technology operates under the University's Technical Sub-Council and serves as a hub for innovation, problem-solving, and interdisciplinary collaboration. Guided by the motto of transforming imaginative ideas into functional robots, the Club focuses on hands-on learning, creativity, and real-world application of engineering principles. Its vision emphasises empowering creativity, turning theory into practice through design and prototyping, supporting complete project lifecycles, and fostering inclusive teamwork among students from diverse disciplines. For 2024–25, the Club was mentored by Dr. Prince Kumar Singh and Dr. Vijay Shanker Chaudhary, Faculty Advisors, Robotics Club, and Assistant Professors in the Department of Electronics and Communication Engineering. Their guidance helped shape the year's activities and ensure a balance between technical learning and practical application.

The academic year began with Hover Hawk, a two-day workshop dedicated to drone technology and its applications in robotics. Conducted for over 300 participants, the workshop covered drone components, real-life use cases, and hands-on assembly. Live demonstrations on safe flying techniques provided students with valuable practical exposure and a strong foundation in aerial robotics. The flagship event of the year, Robomania '25, was a multi-day techno-fest combining robotics, gaming, and puzzle-solving challenges. Signature competitions like Robo Wars and Robo Soccer tested participants' design, control, and competitive spirit in intense robot battles and matches. Events such as Bomb Diffusion, Sherlocked, and Electronic Maze challenged logical reasoning, coordination, and engineering problem-solving. Adding to the excitement, Laser Strike and ElectroTekken brought immersive gaming experiences featuring tactical and gesture-based combat. The fest attracted widespread participation and provided a platform for students to innovate, compete, and explore advanced technologies. Overall, 2024–25 was a year marked by innovation, teamwork, and technical advancement for the Robotics Club. Through its blend of workshops, competitions, and interactive events, the Club continued to inspire students to push the boundaries of engineering creativity, aligning with its mission to prepare the next generation of problem-solvers and tech innovators.



# **SPORTS SUB-COUNCIL**

The Madan Mohan Malaviya University of Technology's Council of Student Activities (CSA) structures the Sports Sub-Council as the powerhouse behind the university's vibrant sports culture.

The Sports Sub-Council organizes multiple flagship events annually. Event AAYAAS kicked off as the university's biggest annual sports fest. The Inter-Branch Tournaments came next. From February 14 to February 15, 2025, AAYAAS was held at Shaheed Bandhu Singh University Stadium for students across all branches, aimed at showcasing athleticism through track and field events. Around 500+ students participated, with competitions in sprints, long jump, shot put, high jump, discus throw, javelin throw, and relay races. SP City, Gorakhpur, Shri Abhinav Tyagi, the distinguished Chief Guest, spoke about sportsmanship and guided young minds during the inauguration ceremony.

The Sports Sub-Council organized Inter-Branch Tournaments featuring chess, badminton, cricket, kabaddi, hockey, football, volleyball, basketball, and table tennis. Participants from various branches competed with points awarded (15 for winners, 10 for first runners-up, 5 for second runners-up). The tournament promoted healthy competition and unity, with Electrical Engineering Branch emerging as the overall champion, followed by Chemical Engineering branch along with B.Pharm as first runner-up.

The other major initiative conducted by The Sports Sub-Council includes external competition participation. The primary objective was to represent MMMUT at prestigious inter-collegiate festivals like Udghosh '24 (IIT Kanpur), Spardha '24 (IIT BHU), and AAGAZ '25 (HBTU Kanpur). These competitions involved multiple stages with students showcasing their athletic prowess and competitive spirit. Notable achievements include Team KHO KHO securing 2nd position at Udghosh '24, multiple medal wins at AAGAZ '25 including Gold in 100m race, and strong performances across various sports disciplines.

TechSrijan is one of the leading techno-management festivals in Eastern Uttar Pradesh, collaboratively organized by the IEEE Student Branch (IEEE-SB MMMUT) and the SAE Chapter at MMMUT. 

# Ahilyabai Holkar



In the vast canvas of India's history, countless rulers and warriors are remembered for their conquests and grandeur. Yet, some extraordinary figures remain hidden from popular memory despite leaving behind legacies that continue to shape our society. One remarkable yet often unsung figure is Punyashlok Rani Ahilyabai Holkar, whose name deserves to be spoken with deep respect and pride even today. Sadly, many people still do not know about her immense contributions to our cultural, social, and administrative heritage. Recognizing this, the Government of India has begun celebrating her third birth centenary with special programs to spread awareness about her life and to remind us of the timeless values she embodied. Devi Ahilyabai Holkar was born in 1725 in the small village of Chondi in present-day Maharashtra. Unlike most rulers who inherited kingdoms by birth, Ahilyabai came from an ordinary family. Her life changed when Malhar Rao Holkar, the noble Maratha subedar, noticed her intelligence and pious nature and arranged her marriage to his son Khanderao Holkar. However, fate tested her early on. She lost her husband at a young age during a battle and later faced the tragic deaths of her father-in-law and only son. In an age when widows were expected to live in seclusion and silence, Ahilyabai refused to succumb to grief and social restrictions. Instead, she chose the far more difficult path — to rule.

Ascending the throne of the Malwa kingdom in 1767, she stepped into a role that few women of her time could even imagine holding. What followed was a reign that proved a woman's capability to govern with wisdom, compassion, and an unshakeable sense of duty. At a time when women's voices were suppressed, Ahilyabai actively worked to uplift other women in her kingdom. She supported girls' education by establishing schools, a revolutionary idea for the 18th century when female literacy was almost unheard of. She set up shelters for widows so that they could live with dignity instead of

being forced into a life of neglect and humiliation. Beyond her contributions to society and governance, Ahilyabai's love for dharma and Indian culture gave her a special place in the hearts of devotees across the country. Recognizing the deep spiritual and cultural value of these places, Ahilyabai undertook the enormous task of rebuilding and restoring them. It was under her patronage that the famous Kashi Vishwanath Temple in Varanasi was rebuilt, reviving one of Hinduism's most sacred sites. She didn't stop there — she funded and restored temples at Somnath, Dwarka, Ayodhya, Mathura, and countless other holy places. To support pilgrims and saints, she built dharamshalas, ghats, and water tanks to ensure that travelers could visit these sacred sites comfortably and safely.

As India celebrates 300 years since Ahilyabai Holkar's birth, her life reminds us of the values that should guide us even in the 21st century. Her story is an example of how a leader can empower women through education and protection, strengthen a state with transparent and just governance, and revive a nation's cultural pride through selfless devotion. In today's world, where people still struggle for fair governance and women continue to fight for equality, Ahilyabai's life offers valuable lessons. Her example proves that courage and compassion together can transform society for the better.

Lokmata Ahilyabai Holkar's life is a testament to what vision, courage, and empathy can achieve. She rose from being a simple village girl to becoming one of India's most beloved rulers. Through her unwavering commitment to her people, respect for dharma, and farsighted welfare measures, she not only transformed Malwa but also left an indelible mark on India's spiritual and cultural landscape. Let us ensure that the legacy of this great queen does not remain confined to history books but lives on in the values we uphold and the society we shape.
